<p>1700</p>	<p><i>Anne</i> 8 March 1702 - 1 Aug. 1714</p>  <p>Church roof boss</p>	<p>Abraham Baker became rector (also rector of Chedgrave and Ditchingham) presented by Neville Catelyn.</p>  <p>Elva House built. It had an unusual triangular fireplace and a staircase erected around 1700 but perhaps not original to the house.</p>  <p>Sir Nevill died in July, childless, and was buried in the church in 1702. His third wife Mary, was left Kirby Cane for the rest of her life. She married Sir Charles Turner of Warham who was the MP for King's Lynn from 1695 until his death. They seem to have continued to live in the Hall.</p> <p>The Turners also held Wingfield Hall, as did the later Wilsons.</p> <p><i>Sir Neville Catelyn's heraldic bird</i></p>
<p>1704</p>	<p>The Navigation was sold to Richard Nelson (a Bungay Reeve who died 1727) and John Dalling, Earsham, who was sole proprietor until 1733.</p>	
<p>1708</p>	<p>Henry Mickleburgh rented lands in Ellingham, Kirby Cane and Stockton, feeding his cattle upon the Micklefenn common. He paid tithes to the respective rectors, but the Rev. Crisp presented him with a demand for more. The case was dismissed.</p>	
<p>1711</p>	<p>Constable: John Theobald.</p>	<p>Constable: Edward Mickleburgh Fen Reeve: Richard Neller.</p>
